#### Dear Friends,

It has been an exceptional summer with successive heat waves and an absence of any sustained rainfall until relatively recently. The vagaries of the weather are one of the areas those involved in agriculture have to contend with. So, the conditions have benefited those growing apples but have been a disaster for broccoli producers, all of which will impact upon the prices that we pay.

As I write this the latest inflation figures have been published and the main factor putting pressure on the official rate is rising food prices, and in the coming months we will see the impact on domestic budgets.

However, in real terms, we are fortunate. The continuing situation in Gaza reminds us that in too many places life is fragile, and a meaningful harvest unlikely. One has to wonder what those caught up in places of conflict or natural disaster might make of news stories here, discussing how stunted broccoli might be this year because of the summer weather. It is hard to imagine what it must be like to queue up in the hope of finding some food, when relief agencies do not have enough to go around and where black market profiteers will be exploiting people at their weakest.

The scenes of the humanitarian crisis in Gaza are shocking in the extreme, and the so-called disproportionate response of the Israeli government a matter of grave concern to the international community, who seem unable to find a way to encourage a more compassionate response to people who have suffered so much. And while this goes on, there are still hostages being held and families becoming increasingly fearful of what is now going to take place because of the attitude of Benjamin Netanyahu.

Harvest for many this year will not come, not because of weather or global warming but because of the inhumanity of

those who hold power. Every time I wander round the supermarket and see the choices that confront me, I can see the harrowing images of those queuing in the hope of gaining something to stave off the hunger pains that are an ever-present reality.

Maybe this harvest time we are confronted by two challenges, the first is not to become immune to the reality of the ordinary people of Gaza as they scramble for food, as they flee from yet more military activity, and as they ask questions as to why the world is not responding to their plight.

The second thing that situation demands is for us to consider how much food we waste and what we can do to reduce this to express our solidarity with those who might look with relish on what we throw away. My parents were both born in the 1930s and I can remember as we were growing up the insistence that our plates food was consumed and with as little as possible wasted, a legacy of life in when our country was at war.

We appear to live in a much more throwaway culture and we need to try to take steps to avoid unnecessary waste as a sign of our concern for those who have little. This will also hopefully encourage us to be mindful of the needs of the poorest in our society and seek to do our bit in supporting Food Banks and other initiatives which strive to give people some dignity in the midst of ongoing challenges. It is inevitable that when life becomes more challenging, it is the poorest who are hit the hardest and our hope has to be that are not forgotten.

Harvest is, I would suggest, about much more than what comes forth on the land. It has local, national and global considerations and invites us to think about what it is to be good citizens and how we can play our part in trying to ensure that all have something.

#### Weedon Parish Council - Play Area Consultation

The Parish Council is starting to review the play equipment in the Park, to consider timely replacements and additions over the next few years.



It's hard to believe that it was 10 years ago in 2015 that we celebrated the opening of the re-developed Play Area, following donations from local benefactors, a Parish Council grant and funding by WREN – the Waste Recovery and Environmental Services organisation.

Since then, the Parish Council has managed the Play Area, which is inspected annually by ROSPA, carrying out continuing repairs and maintenance to ensure that all the equipment is compliant and the

grounds are safe for all to use. We are fortunate that the items are still in good condition, but gradually some will need replacing and this is **YOUR** time to become involved.

The Parish Council has access to some limited funding which should allow for the upgrade or replacement of at least one or two pieces of equipment or provide something new.

Particularly if you are a regular user of the Play Area, please let us **HEAR YOUR VIEWS**. #### Weedon Parish Council - Environmental Concerns

We are lucky to have great access to a large network of public footpaths in and around Weedon. It's important we can ALL enjoy them. Unfortunately, we must bring to your attention again that inconsiderate behaviour by a few is causing nuisance to the law-abiding majority.



#### DOG WASTE

Dog owners and walkers must keep all pavements, footpaths, verges, grazing fields and other public areas clear of dog excrement by bagging it and disposing of it appropriately. Dogs should be kept under control on public footpaths and roads – including routes across privately owned fields – so that owners can check if any dog mess needs clearing up.

Please pick up AND dispose responsibly. This is simple respect for other walkers, farmers and landowners, as well as being proper law-abiding behaviour. There are 3 dog waste bins in the village, which are emptied regularly, so you're never far from one: on Aston Abbotts Road at the Park and by the track leading to Kirby's Field (adj.no.56) and on lower High Street inside the Fortescue path gate.

Alternatively, take bags home for safe disposal (they can go in your general green-lidded waste bin). Please do not leave any littering the village or surrounding fields. If you see anyone allowing their dogs to foul our public spaces, please say something if you feel able to do so.



The Weedon Wildlife Group aims to protect and promote wildlife in and around Weedon and Hardwick



The equinox has passed and autumn is officially here.

Someone will have said 'the nights are drawing in' and mention of Christmas won't be far away! Autumn is a time of change. The leaves (well those that survived the drought) are turning colour and the summer visitors are away to sunnier climes. There may still be some Swallows passing through, but otherwise it's now a question of awaiting the winter visitors from Europe. Fieldfares and Redwings will be the first, and if we're lucky, we might get a fall of Waxwings this year. Together with our resident birds, they'll be feasting on the abundance of nuts and berries that can be found in our hedgerows and gardens.

As autumn sets in, the temptation to tidy the garden takes hold - just say no! Untidy gardens are great for wildlife especially through winter where they provide much needed shelter and they often take pride of place in our garden awards scheme. 

#### Gardener's Corner Jobs to do in thegarden for October

- Plant evergreen shrubs and conifer hedges while the soil is still warm
- Remove any pot saucers and raise pots up onto feet to prevent waterlooging over winter
- Reduce the height of shrub roses to avoid windrock damage over winter
- Remove large fruits on fig trees that have failed to ripen, leaving pea-sized fruits to develop for harvesting next year
- Sow green manure, such as winter rye, rather than leaving soil bare over winter and this will provide a feed to the soil
- Cut down the ferny shoots of asparagus to soil level once they've turned yellow, then add to the compost bin
- Clear away old crops, so they can't harbour pests and diseases on the yea plot through the winter
- Wrap grease bands around the trunks of apple, pear, cherry and plum trees to trap the crawling female winter moth
- Cut fruited stems of blackberries and autumn raspberries down to the ground
- Raise pumpkins and squash onto bricks to keep them dry and expose them to more sun, to ripen the skins
- Order bare-root fruit trees and bushes for planting from late autumn to early spring
- Feed house plants once a week with liquid fertiliser, continuing through to autumn
- Clean out the greenhouse to get rid of debris that can harbour overwintering pests and diseases
- Wash greenhouse glazing to let in as much of the weaker autumn daylight as possible
- Build a log pile at the back of a border for wildlife to shelter in
- Empty ceramic and glazed pots that aren't frost proof and store in a
- shed over winter
